Muzzle velocity 84 m/s The RPG-2 is a forerunner of the well-known RPG-7 and is a far more basic weapon. Its slim profile and single pistol grip distinguish it from similar weapons, such as the RPG-7 and its derivatives. Developed shortly after the Second World War (c. late 1940s), the RPG-2 fires a fin-stabilised 40 mm high-explosive rocket. The weapon's sights consist of simple retractable posts and it has no mounting attachment for optical sights, such as those fitted to the RPG-7. The weapon is in widespread service in many parts of the world and manufactured as the Type 56 in China. The disc-shaped 'venturi' at the rear of the tube is removable and some (particularly well-used) weapons are likely to be found without it.

Variants and their distinguishing features

VARIANTS (Model/manufacturer) • RPG-2, Russia • Type 56, China

Russian and Chinese variants of the RPG-2 are virtually identical. Reference should be made to the left-hand side of the pistol grip. Russian RPG-2 weapons are marked in Cyrillic script with model numbers and manufacturers' markings. Early Chinese Type 56 weapons feature Chinese characters. Later models may be marked 'Type 56' in Western script for the export market.



Points to include when recording information about the weapon:

- 1. Serial number, including all prefix and suffix characters
- 2. Characters adjacent to fire selector
- 3. Any other engraved/stamped information on weapon
