The Dragunov SVD sniper rifle first entered service in the early 1960s and is widely deployed around the world. Although the weapon bears some mechanical similarities to Kalashnikov-pattern weapons, its design differs in many respects. The weapon's primary distinguishing features are its skeletal stock and its long, narrow profile.

Points to include when recording information about the weapon:

- 1. Serial number, including all prefix and suffix characters
- 2. Characters adjacent to fire selector
- 3. Any other engraved/stamped information on weapon

The Romanian FPK (PSL) closely resembles the SVD, but is based on the receiver of the RPK light machine gun. The design of the ejection port and the absence of a receiver cover lever (located at the rear, right-hand side of the receiver) are visual features that differentiate the FPK from the SVD. The SVU is a 'bullpup' version of the SVD that has been reconfigured

with the magazine behind (instead of in front of) the trigger assembly. The SVDK resembles the SVDS, but is rechambered to fire a larger 9.3 x 64 mm cartridge. The Type 79 and SVD are visually identical. The most effective means of discriminating between the two weapons is by consulting manufacturer markings. The Al-Kadesih features a palm tree embossed on the magazine.
